The Gospel Matthew 5:13-20

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

"You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot.

"You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.

"Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.

People We lift them to the Lord.


Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

generation, we lift our voices with all creation as we sing:



The Celebrant continues

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

Remembering his death and resurrection, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ. Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit and live as Christ's Body in the world. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons, that with St. John and all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. **Amen**.





# Reflection: Matthew 5:13-20

In today's passage from the Gospel of Matthew, we often focus on the powerful imagery of "salt" and "light." But what we might want to shift our attention to is all the talk of the "law and the prophets." And when we talk about "the law and the prophets," we also need to talk about those who knew and excelled in their knowledge of and their practice of their observance: the scribes and the pharisees. Jesus, constantly upending our expectations of what he might say, preaches to those present as follows: "For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." A couple of things to note. Matthew is the most Jewish of all our gospels; he was writing to and for a primarily Jewish-Christian audience, who had a solid background and understanding of Jewish scripture and culture. In other words, they would have known, often personally, both Pharisees and scribes. And Jesus is upping the ante on the disciples' behavior, not, I think, to give them tremendous anxiety about their moral performance, but actually to remind them that they can do nothing without his help!

When you hear today's readings and when you think about the back and forth of this conversation between Jesus and the disciples, you are invited to ponder these questions:

- 1. In what ways does this passage confront our stereotypes, often negative, of the "Pharisees and scribes?"
- 2. How do you understand Jesus' implicit concern to rely on Him for help in living a righteous life?
- 3. In what ways does Jesus continue to challenge and not just console you and what do you do with this challenge?
